Hunting for a good bargain? Beware of dangerous fakes!

Counterfeit or fake goods are often found in physical and online spaces at lower prices to attract consumer attention. The trademark (name/logo), packaging and/or the authentic product itself are imitated and passed off to the consumer as an authentic product.

Dangerous fakes fail to comply with quality norms and standards, including adequate product material or content and labeling and post-manufacture handling requirements.When purchasing dangerous fakes, consumers possibly unknowingly expose themselves and others to health and safety risks associated therewith. For example, fake brake pads can lead to injury as they might fail to timely stop the car. Fake toys can cause digestion problems in children due to hazardous materials. Fake baby prams and toddler car seats often lack structural integrity and can cause them to collapse or break with the child inside causing injury. Fake electronics can cause electric shock and present fire hazards, while fake batteries can cause burns to the body and products to meltdown.

Harmful substances, such as aluminum, arsenic and mercury, have been found in fake cosmetics and lead to rashes, allergic reactions, and chemical burns. Fake foods and beverages often contain bacterial contamination, hazardous and/or toxic materials and inadequate or missing preservative systems. High levels of allergens and absent or decreased levels of drug and/or sanitizing/disinfectant active ingredients are often present in feminine care products, disinfecting/sanitizing products and pet products that are fake.

The lack of sufficient or too much active ingredient, hazardous and/or toxic ingredients, and bacterial contamination among other things in fake medication causes ineffective treatment of disease and even life-threatening situations.

Dangerous fakes pose a serious threat to public health and public safety, besides causing financial and reputation loss to the brand owner and can also be tackled based on administrative regulations (product safety and product labeling), besides intellectual property, criminal and civil regulations. Consumers can avoid purchasing dangerous fakes by looking out for red flags, such as unusually low prices, product quality, product source, spelling errors on the product and/or product packaging and/or product label and product packaging material.



The Bureau is not a regulatory body and therefore does not have any law enforcing authorities. By law, the Bureau can only carry out tasks pertaining to the registrations of trademarks, provide information to the public regarding intellectual property, and thereto related matters. The Bureau's position is neutral. Given the fact that the Bureau must serve all entrepreneurs, it cannot take the side of one party in a conflict, since this would automatically result in no longer being able to serve all. The Bureau cannot act against any infringement of intellectual property rights or the suspicion thereof. Furthermore, the law does not provide for any instruments for the Bureau to conduct any procedures in relation to infringement or dispute settlement. In the event of any (suspected) infringement, a lawsuit should be filed with the civil court by the owner of the intellectual property rights.
